Dr. Avidan Milevsky is an Associate Professor of Behavioral Sciences at Ariel University in Israel and a psychologist at Wellspring Counseling with offices in Towson, MD and Bet Shemesh, Israel. His research on families, parenting, and siblings has produced over 100 papers presented at conferences in the United States, Canada, and Europe. Dr. Milevsky is also a columnist for Psychology Today and The Huffington Post on family issues.
